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Greetings from the Office of the Mayor:

Here is hoping that by the time you receive this newsletter, the cold, snowy winter of 2013-2014 is in the past so we can all switch gears to get ready for a beautiful spring and summer. This winter reminded me of growing up in Cudahy and of the harsh winters of 1978 and 1979. The snow was so high, one had to creep out of the intersections trying to see around snow piles. Winters like this are hard on the city's aging infrastructure, however our Department of Public Works and Water Utility did a fantastic job keeping our citizens moving during this harsh year. As we move forward in 2014, we will see many other improvements to our municipal infrastructure.

Spring and summer offers us a renewed opportunity to get to know our neighbors and to witness our community's growth. I encourage you to take advantage of the many different events here in our community.

Winter events included the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of St. Nikola Church and School, 125<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Patrick Cudahy Company, the Home Town Holiday celebration, Sheridan Park Friends Centennial celebration dinner, and a showing of the Emmy Award Winning show [Around the Corner with John McGivern](#) which aired on MPTV in February. These are just a few of the many things that happened in our community, which helped get us through the long winter.

Upcoming spring and summer events will include Earth Day / Arbor Day Celebration (April 26<sup>th</sup>), UPAF Bike Ride through Cudahy (June 1<sup>st</sup>), Cudahy Family Movie Nights (June 19<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup>), Cudahy 4<sup>th</sup> of July Parade and Daylong Celebration,

Race for the Bacon (July 31<sup>st</sup>), Sweet Apple Wood Days, and a host of other publically and privately sponsored events. I encourage you to enjoy these events and the many others here in our community.

The fall and winter season was also a very active time for your Common Council. In October the Council approved funding to allow for the remaking of our city's website which currently runs on a 2002 platform. The project is currently in the works and should be completed soon, making it more user-friendly for our citizens. During October and November, the Finance Committee and Common Council passed my responsible Executive Budget for the City, allowing us to maintain services at a cost effective price to the taxpayers we serve.

Quite ironically, on the evening of December 17<sup>th</sup>, while the Common Council honored two citizens for their bravery in pulling a resident from a burning building; two families were displaced due to a house fire. Members of our community and the surrounding region stepped up with donations to the displaced families after I put out the call for assistance which makes me proud. As these families continue to put their lives back in order, they and I cannot thank everyone enough for the compassion and generosity shown. This is just another example how Cudahy is special; if people need help, others rise to the occasion.

In 2014, the Common Council held another Chronic Nuisance hearing to recover excessive police services costs on a property here in Cudahy. I took recommendations on the Dump Fee to the Board of Public works in February (which are currently under review). In March, we are finishing off an 11 month process of updating our Five Year City Financial Plan which includes municipal borrowing

and notes for much needed improvements to our aging roads, sewer, water, building, infrastructure and necessary equipment.

At the first meeting of the new Common Council, I laid my top priorities of community-wide development and redevelopment efforts, business retention and new business growth. Getting shovels in the ground remains a top priority of my administration and we continue to work on these efforts daily. Through public and private investment, our community can and will grow and I am pleased to report some of the following efforts.

In 2013, we saw an expansion to C R Industries, a new Wheaton Franciscan Clinic, the opening of the Angelic Bake House and the completion of one building of the Squire Village Apartments which added approximately 6 million dollars in value to our community.

In 2014, construction will begin on:  
EZ Storage building on Pennsylvania Avenue with 11,000 square feet of retail space.  
Three buildings will be added to the Squire Village Apartments.  
The Haven at Sweet Apple Wood (a community based residential facility),  
Expansion of Lippmann Manufacturing

We are also in the early stages of a letter of interest for development on City / CDA owned parcels on Packard and Layton Avenues which could potentially add \$24 million dollars of value to our city. We will continue to actively pursue interested parties for the development and redevelopment on City / CDA owned land during 2014 and 2015.

In addition to these efforts, we have worked with local community investors on the establishment by a Cudahy resident of a local deli/grocery store in the downtown area. The apartments next to Pick N Save have been privately purchased; the new owner has made major improvements. We've met with two private investors regarding opening a small coffee shop within our downtown area. Two small business owners have received assistance by my

office for relocation of their operations after the buildings they lease were sold to a private entity. While not directly involved in these efforts, the City supports anyone who is willing to make an investment and commitment to our community.

As your Mayor, I will continue to advocate on your behalf to other taxing jurisdictions. Investment in our Park System is important and I work closely with County officials on this matter. I will also continue to work with our state representatives to secure more local road funding, increases in state shared revenue and federal funding and assistance on various issues and causes that benefit our citizens.

On the City side, I will continue to run a cost effective municipal government that provides exceptional service to our residents. Our community has a lot to offer, it is up to you to take advantage of the many good things happening here!

A properly installed and maintained smoke alarm is the only thing in your home that can alert you and your family to a fire 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Whether you're awake or asleep, a working smoke alarm is constantly on alert, scanning the air for fire and smoke.

According to the National Fire Protection Association, almost two-thirds of home fire deaths resulted from fires in properties without working smoke alarms. A working smoke alarm significantly increases your chances of surviving a deadly home fire.

Nearly 70 percent of all fireworks-related injuries take place around the 4th of July holiday. A study by the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission found that more than 50 percent of those injuries occur to children and teenagers. The top three injury-causing fireworks are firecrackers, sparklers, and rockets. Those fireworks account for nearly half of all injuries.



To help reduce the number of fireworks-related injuries this summer, fire & law enforcement agencies are encouraging consumers to keep fireworks out of the hands of children, to safely use legal fireworks and never buy or use illegal fireworks.

Children have a natural curiosity and attraction to water. Please make sure all children are supervised around any water source.

The four major causes of drownings are:

- ✓ Not wearing a life jacket;
- ✓ Abuse of alcohol;
- ✓ Lack of sufficient swimming skills;

## **YARD WASTE AND GRASS CLIPPINGS**

Disposal of grass clippings or other yard waste in the garbage is illegal. Per DNR requirements the City will be checking garbage carts randomly throughout the City to insure that yard waste is not being placed in the garbage carts. If yard waste is identified, the City will tag the cart and will not remove the garbage until the yard waste is removed. Carts with yard waste are documented and registered as a violation. We strongly encourage you to leave the clippings on the lawn. Residents may bring their yard waste to the drop off site during regular hours. There is a fee to dispose of yard waste & grass clippings at the Drop Off Site. The City also provides free pickup of yard waste during Spring Cleanup and Fall Yard Waste Pickup (the first week of November)




## 2014 Spring Clean-Up Schedule

Cudahy will soon be conducting its annual Spring Clean-up. All residents are invited to take advantage of this one time only FREE pickup. Check your basement, attic, garage or yard for any items you would care to discard. This free pick up is limited to fifteen (15) minutes of loading time. **ITEMS the City WILL NOT BE PICKING UP: stone, ground, concrete or items that contain refrigerants, hazardous or toxic waste, paint, tires, waste drain oil, fuel, lubricants or other liquids in containers or fuel tanks, computers, TVs and all other electronic equipment (e-waste).** Lumber needs to be cut in lengths no greater than 4 feet. Yard waste may be put out for the FREE Spring Clean-up. Yard waste shall be placed in large heavy duty paper yard waste bags, card board boxes or re-usable containers. **PLEASE DO NOT PUT YARD WASTE IN PLASTIC BAGS.** Branches left full length will also be collected. They must be placed at the curb, parallel with the street..

Spring Clean-up will be done following two schedules. Properties north of Grange will be done starting Monday May 5<sup>th</sup>. Properties south of Grange including properties along Grange will be done starting the week of May 12<sup>th</sup>. **ALL ITEMS FOR PICK UP MUST BE OUT FOR PICK UP BY 6:00 AM MONDAY OF THE DESIGNATED WEEK OF COLLECTION.** (Residents may put out items starting the Saturday prior to their pick-up date.) There is a crew that picks up refuse and another that picks up yard waste. **Once the crews are through your street, the City will not go back and pick up items placed after they have gone down your street.**

### **DID YOU GET A NEW CITY TREE PLANTED?**

If so, please water the tree. New trees should get a good soaking once a week for the first few summers. When to water and how much to water can be tricky. Too little water and the tree can dry-up, too much water and the tree can drown. So a good rule to follow is when there are a couple days that are windy and dry or very sunny or there is little to no precipitation during the warmer months ó water the tree. Typically 5 gallons of water will soak the entire root well for the size tree the City just planted in front of your property. 5 gallons is equivalent to 5- one gallon milk jugs. In addition, residents with new trees are reminded that weed whackers should not be used around the trunk. The damage caused when the bark is stripped will kill the tree. ### **TREE REMOVAL OF ASH TREES**

In 2009 the City was notified by the DNR that the Emerald Ash Borer beetle was found in a dying ash tree on the south side of the City. Typically the infestation starts out slow and within 5 years a City will experience a severe increase of dying or dead trees. So in 2010 the City hired a company to inventory the City's street trees to determine the number of ash trees the City had and if they could be saved. From that a management plan was developed. Since many of the ash trees planted decades ago were low quality trees it was determined that the most cost effective way to deal with the proposed decline was to begin the removal of ash trees in select areas over the next 5 to 7 years and then replace it with a tree suitable for the urban environment. Following this type of plan allowed the City to manage both costs and the hazards that can come by letting a dying or dead tree stand. In 2012 the City began that removal & replacement plan. So if you see the crews out cutting trees down on a neighborhood block ó they are most likely doing it following the management plan.


### **Packard Avenue Reconstruction**

**Holmes to Cudahy** – The reconstruction of this section of Packard Avenue may be started in 2014 with the majority of work being done in 2015. The City had planned to reconstruct this section of Packard Avenue starting in March of 2014 however the extreme winter conditions has delayed many construction projects throughout Wisconsin putting a premium on 2014 road construction work. Therefore the City bid the project with the idea that some of the work would be started this year with the majority of the paving work being done in 2015. The intent would be that the work that would close done Packard is kept to a minimum. Once the City knows the exact schedule, business owners and property owners affected by the construction will be invited to an informational meeting set for some time in May.

**Cudahy to Lunham** – This year the City's Engineering staff will be working on plans for the reconstruction work on this section of Packard Avenue. The tentative plans include the relaying of sewer and water main in 2015 with a full pavement reconstruction scheduled for 2016. Property owners will be notified as information becomes available.

# HAZARDOUS SIDEWALK PROGRAM

This summer the City will be replacing sidewalk within the City's right of way considered to meet the criteria for hazardous walk. Sidewalk or flatwork within the right of way area is considered a tripping hazard to pedestrians based on a set of criteria as established by the Insurance Industry. Insurance standards recommends that the public sidewalk be inspected and repaired if a hazard is found, at least once in a 5 to 10 year period. In order to accomplish this in a City the size of Cudahy, the City has been divided into 4 zones. Over an 8 year period each zone is inspected and repairs made. This year sidewalks within the area illustrated as Zone 4 on the adjacent map, meeting the hazardous walk criteria, will be replaced. It is the policy of the City to special assess property owners for the work done in front of their property. Only property owners where work is done in front of their property are assessed. An average assessment is around \$360 and would be due by November 1, 2014. Questions relative to the program should be directed to the City's Engineering Department at (414) 769-2212.



## STORM WATER – Pollution Reduction

Pollutants such as grass clippings, road salt, pet waste, oil, pesticides and detergents enter the storm sewer after a rain or snow event and are discharged directly into Lake Michigan. Businesses and residents can help prevent pollutants from entering the storm water by:

- Wash your car on the lawn or at the car wash.
- Pick up and dispose of pet waste by placing it in a bag and putting it in the garbage.
- Dispose of household hazardous waste at designated sites
- Reduce fertilizer and weed control use
- Mow your lawn as to keep the grass clippings out of the street and gutter
- Keep leaf piles several feet away from inlet grates
- Never dump or stockpile dirt or wood chips in the street.

# Focus on Training with the Cudahy Police Department

Positive changes have been implemented in the way current and future police personnel will be trained at the Cudahy Police Department. Early on in 2014 the staff of Cudahy Police instructors unanimously decided to overhaul an already successful in-house training program and make it more "stream-lined." The Cudahy Police Department has a goal of conducting in-house training on a quarterly basis. Conducting in-house training can be a cost effective and efficient way to provide ongoing instruction to staff.

Led by Sergeants Chris Blunt and Sean Harrington, the training division selected three new officers who would be cross-trained as both Unified Tactics Instructors as well as Field Training Officers.

New law enforcement instructors are enrolled in the State mandated Instructor Development Course (IDC). IDC is a learning-intensive 32-hour training course, which provides the essentials of training and teaches instructors how to create a performance-based instructional environment that maximizes student learning through scenario based training. Instructors learn to provide instruction that produces knowledge and skills relate to on-the-job performance.

Rather than being trained to teach one or two tactical skills separately, the Cudahy Police Department's Unified Tactical Instructors will be cross-trained to teach law enforcement officers the tactics of Professional Communication Skills (PCS), Vehicle Contacts, Defensive and Arrest Tactics (DAAT) and Firearms. This cross training provides a well-rounded, knowledgeable instructor whose instruction takes the tenets of all of the tactics into account without unwittingly creating training scars that conflict with other unified tactics.

The staff members selected for this leadership role within the agency are Sergeant Tom Livesey, Sergeant Sean Harrington and new training team members Corporal Craig Bultman, Officer Shawn Doyle and Officer Brad Summers.

The Unified Tactical Instructors have been selected to attend Field Training Officer (FTO) School. Newly hired Cudahy Police Officers will be taken through the 10-week FTO program by the most highly skilled instructors.

To set the training baseline for the Cudahy Police Department, Chief Poellot and the Unified Tactical Instructors have attended Verbal Defense and Influence (VDI) Instructor Training. School Resource Officers Steve Kaminski and Mike Strzok have also been trained as VDI instructors.

VDI is offered by the Vistelar Corporation. National trainer Gary Klugiewicz is a retired Milwaukee County Sheriff Department Captain and is the Director of Training of the Vistelar Corporation. Mr. Klugiewicz has completed a one-day VDI training session with every member of the Cudahy Police Department's staff including all sworn law enforcement staff, dispatchers, clerks, auxiliary and community service officers. Our VDI skills are applicable to our sworn and non-sworn staff internally when working with fellow staff and other city departments and externally when working with the community and law enforcement partners.

The basis for VDI is treating people with dignity by showing them respect. There are 5 maxims that we try to use when communicating with people. We try to use the techniques unless it is inappropriate, inadequate or ineffective. We will act immediately if there is a safety issue such as danger to others or ourselves, danger to

property under our control, flight from our lawful and/or supervisory presence, or revised priorities caused by a new or increased safety threats. Whenever possible, we 1) engage in active listening by listening with all our senses, 2) ask people to do things rather than tell them, 3) explain why we're asking someone to do something, 4) offer positive options, explain possible negative consequences and follow up again with the positive options, and 5) whenever possible, give people a second chance.

Our trained system of communication is designed to generate not only compliance but also cooperation and collaboration. Our trained system of communication guides us in making initial contacts, making appropriate decisions and closing the contact in the appropriate way. Both sworn and non-sworn staff has been given instruction in the persuasion sequence, which helps guide the timing of decisions to take appropriate action in situations where there is noncompliance. These methods increase safety and effectiveness while decreasing stress. This training offers the same "playbook" for all Cudahy Police Department staff. Our goal is to respond in an effective manner during stressful interactions instead of impulsively reacting.

VDI coupled with the State of Wisconsin's unified tactics course are paramount in the training of all Cudahy Officers. Our ongoing training program is designed to give our entire staff a tactical edge in how we communicate and interact with the public and to benefit our employees in the way they manage conflict, maintain safety and reduce stress and civil liability.

***FROM THE ASSESSOR'S OFFICE...***

Q. What are the timeframes for assessment changes?

A. Assessment Values and General Timeframes:

The assessment staff is available throughout the year to address and answer general questions about assessed values, but due to Wisconsin Law, changes in assessments and appeals must be conducted during certain periods before the close of the assessment roll. This is not a tax bill time. Appointments can be made during normal business hours and review requests can be submitted regarding your property value throughout the year. The Assessor conducts an open book session every year before closing the Assessment Roll. This is an informal session that allows you to examine assessment rolls and ask questions. You will be notified if a change occurs in your assessed value. Notice that the assessment roll year is open for review is posted. The notice will state the dates and time of the Board of Review and will be posted at City hall, the Cudahy Family Library, the Post Office located in Cudahy at the Packard Plaza and in the Journal Southshore NOW as well as our City Website.

After the conclusion of the open book, a formal appeal process is conducted and the Board of Review is held. This is a formal session in which a hearing where both the taxpayer and assessor may present evidence of a property's fair market value to the board.

- Spring into Summer but be Prepared

Spring and summer in Wisconsin usually mean warmer weather, outside fun, festivals and hopefully no snow. With the joys of the warmer months on the way, be aware that potential dangers such as Thunder Storms and Tornados may be on the way also. To be prepared for tornados, be alert to changing weather conditions. Look for approaching storms. Look for the following danger signs: Dark, often greenish sky, Large hail, A large, dark, low-lying cloud (particularly if rotating), Loud roar, similar to a freight train. If you see approaching storms or any of the danger signs, be prepared to take shelter immediately. Be prepared for any emergency by being informed, creating a plan and building an emergency kit.
