Ladies and Gentlemen:

It is with great pleasure that I present the 2006 Annual Report, which highlights and summarizes the activities of the Cudahy Police Department. You can be extremely proud of the Police Department employees who achieve excellence in the difficult job of law enforcement. These men and women are dedicated to providing the highest level of professional service to our community. They are Cudahy's strongest assets.

The statistics are showing a disturbing trend of increased drug use, specifically the abuse of heroin and related synthetic opiates and opioids, creating unique challenges for enforcement. Seven significant drug overdose cases occurred this past year resulting in four deaths.

We have focused our police resources on these drug issues during 2006, which in turn resulted in more than double the number of drug possession arrests than in 2005. We also executed more search warrants directed at drug dealers to curtail the drug activity within our community. We will continue a strong and measured attack on drug usage, sales and possession with new and innovative means to increase our effectiveness against the drug culture in our neighborhoods.

On the positive side, the statistics did show a reduction of 7% for the Violent Crime occurrences, which include Murder, Rape, Robbery and Aggravated Assault. There was only a small increase of 2% for Property Crimes such as Burglary, Theft and Arson.

As the current Chief of Police, I would like to thank the Mayor, Common Council and the Police and Fire Commission for their continued support. Without their efforts, our job would be much more difficult. To all citizens of our great city, I ask again for your continued support, trust and assistance as our employees attempt to provide the best possible service to each one of you. Without the help that many citizens provide on an ongoing basis, we would not have been able to achieve and respond to the challenges that were presented to us.

EMPATHY – We believe that all persons should be treated with sensitivity and understanding.


EXCELLENCE – We strive for personal and professional excellence, dedication to duty and service to the public.

DAY SHIFT

Police Officers Mark Boziel, Robert Danek, Michael Strzok, Steven Kaminski, Frank Stahl, James Karweik, Detectives Dala Milosavljevic, Michael Carchesi, Sergeant Randy Scheel, Captain Stan Kay and Chief Richard Wargin staff the Day Shift. Mark Boziel retired in April after 29 years of service. Andrew Kitzrow joined the Day Shift in fall working the Early Power Shift from noon to 8 p.m. Lead Emergency Services Dispatcher Toni Peterson, and Emergency Services Dispatchers Marcia Herrick and Kim Mewes staffed the Communications Center.

Working from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., the Department's most veteran officers with 17 to 27 years of service each comprise the Day Shift. Recently, retired Officer Gary Kuchenreuther was added as a Part Time Court Liaison Officer for State criminal and traffic cases prosecuted by the Milwaukee County District Attorney's Office. This allows officers to remain in the City to handle calls for service and reduces the amount of officer overtime.

Day Shift Officers handle a large number of calls for service including documenting and completing Incident and Accident Reports. Due to the large volume of motor vehicle traffic during the Day Shift, officers handled nearly one-half of the 342 motor vehicle accidents that occurred in 2006. Officers Strzok, Kaminski and Stahl serve as the Department's Firearm Instructors and Tactical Team Members. Officers Danek, Stahl and Karweik are trained as evidence technicians for processing crime scenes. Officer Karweik also serves as a liaison with the City Inspection Department for abandoned and junk vehicles.

We currently do not have any Juvenile Officers. Therefore, the Patrol Officers are sent to the Cudahy schools to handle any police services that are required. Our Department conducted drug searches of the High School with the assistance of other agencies' K-9 units. In 2006, there were several Crime Stopper Quick 50 tips at the schools, which resulted in arrests ranging from possession of drugs to a student in possession of a knife.

Due to staffing shortages, Officers have been conducting criminal investigations that would normally be handled by Detectives. Officers took the initial complaints and investigated white-collar crimes, such as fraud complaints and identity thefts that have increased in number over the past few years. These types of complaints and investigations can be very time consuming and place great demands on police resources.

With their extensive knowledge and experience, Officers on the Day Shift are able to handle a large variety of situations that they encounter on a daily basis. The entire staff works well as a team and I am proud to supervise the shift.

DETECTIVE BUREAU

Detectives Dala Milosavljevic, Michael Carchesi and Glen Haase were assigned to the Bureau. During 2006, Detective Haase continued his temporary assignment with the High Intensity Drug Trafficking Agency (HIDTA). This assignment has proven to provide assets to the City of Cudahy. Officer Joseph Zblewski had been selected for a temporary assignment to the Bureau in 2005. While he has not been able to assume the position because of staffing constraints, Officer Zblewski has conducted several drug investigations and worked closely with Detective Milosavljevic on several cases in addition to his patrol duties.

Detectives are usually assigned to investigate sensitive crimes such as rape, child abuse, child sexual assault and elder abuse. These cases often require special interview skills. Crimes against vulnerable people, such as children and the elderly usually require a confession for a provable case and to avoid forcing victims to testify.

We continue to train our Detectives in the investigation of sensitive crimes. We also employ the CVSA (computer voice stress analyzer) for truth verification. Detective Milosavljevic has conducted examinations in critical cases for other departments as well, including the Milwaukee County Sheriff's Office. Detectives Carchesi and Milosavljevic investigated 19 complaints of crimes against children in 2006. We will continue to place a high priority on these cases.

We experienced fifteen robberies in 2006, four of which were of financial institutions. We have had as many robberies in previous years; but I see an increased level of violence or potential for violence. Most of the robberies are related to drug abuse – heroin and crack cocaine in particular. We cleared 11 of the 15 robberies.

In 2006, the Cudahy Police Department seized 267 grams of marijuana, 14.6 grams of cocaine and more than 600 narcotic pills. We conducted a “reverse sting” with two Egyptian nationals and seized more than \$6,500 from them. We received \$4,000 in shared federal asset forfeitures. We also took advantage of a new State law that allows local police departments to seize cash from drug dealers in Circuit Court. We received approximately \$900 from such cases in 2006. This money can be used to purchase equipment we may not have otherwise been able to buy. There is a certain satisfaction or justice in using money from drug dealers to get the equipment to fight them.

The single most challenging drug problem we faced in 2006 was the abuse of heroin and related synthetic opiates and opioids. In 2006, we investigated 4 overdose deaths and 3 overdoses where the person survived. We made investigating heroin/opiate cases a priority. In March, we participated with HIDTA in the investigation of the theft of hundreds of oxycodone pills from Fed Ex. In May, Detective Milosavljevic led the investigation into a conspiracy to distribute oxycodone pills. A 41-year-old Cudahy man, his 32-year-old girlfriend and a 28-year-old Oconomowoc man were arrested. Officers seized more than 600 pills from them.

Law enforcement is becoming more complex and demanding. The courts and citizens are expecting the use of technology to show our interactions with people and to uncover more objective evidence. The Detectives of the Cudahy Police Department will strive to continue to provide an excellent level of police service to the citizens of Cudahy.

EARLY SHIFT

Officers Craig Hauski, Greg Karas, Shawn Grimm, Joseph Zblewski, Robert Jachowicz, Anthony Andrews, Sgt Chris Blunt and I (Lt. David Aamodt) were assigned to the Early Shift (4 p.m.-midnight) in 2006. Officer Andrew Kitzrow was assigned to Early Power Shift (12 noon-8 p.m.) and Officer Horace Craft was assigned to the Late Power Shift (8 p.m.-4 a.m.). Dispatchers Erin Zirzow, Kristy Ralston and Heidi Eichner also worked the Early Shift. I will take advantage of this opportunity to present to you some of the critical incidents that Early Shift Officers and Dispatchers dealt with in 2006:

On January 19th at 4:00 p.m., 3 armed men forced their way into an apartment in the 4900 Block of South Packard Avenue and beat the two men and women that occupied it. The 49-year-old male occupant was pistol whipped by one of the suspects. All three were treated and released at St. Luke's South Shore. Officer Kitzrow and Detective Milosavljevic investigated the complaint and identified one of the suspects. He was charged with a felony Battery, misdemeanor Batteries and Criminal Trespass to a Dwelling. (I06-0134)

On Sunday January 22nd, we received a report of a 43-year-old man in Warnimont Park, who intended to kill himself by drowning in Lake Michigan. A preliminary search of the area proved unsuccessful and a large scale search effort was launched. A Level II SMART response (mutual aid) was called and the Department Tactical Team was called in. The Cudahy Fire Department provided their mobile command post and the Coast Guard responded with a helicopter from Michigan. With a thermal imaging device borrowed from the Fire Department, Officer Shawn Grimm located the man hiding in heavy shrubs. The 43-year-old man was medically cleared at St. Luke's South Shore and then taken to the Milwaukee County Mental Health Center on an involuntary commitment. (I06-0155)

On March 20th at 6:30 p.m., two men (one armed with a butcher knife and one armed with a handgun) robbed the Marathon Gas Station at 6275 South Packard Avenue. The two men escaped with more than \$600. On March 23rd at 12:55 p.m., one of the two suspects returned and attempted to rob the station by knife point. The suspect was followed to a nearby apartment building in the 6100 Block of Packard Avenue. The Cudahy Police Department's Tactical Unit was called up and established containment of the building. The 34-year-old suspect was taken into custody as he walked out of the apartment building armed with a butcher knife. The man was questioned by Officer Zblewski and he confessed to his

participation in both robberies. He said they initially planned to kill the attendant in the first robbery and that his accomplice argued with him because he did not. The suspect further confessed that he was returning to the gas station to rob it and kill the clerk when he was arrested. The suspect is a heroin addict. He also told Officer Zblewski he was responsible for 6 additional armed robberies in the City of Milwaukee. (I06-0527 / I06-0546)

On March 11th at 8:45 p.m., Officers Grimm and Zblewski responded to a complaint of a youth with a handgun on the Lincoln Elementary School grounds. The investigation showed that 2 youths were arguing and throwing gang signs. One of the boys pulled out a pistol and aimed it at the chest of the other. The Officers arrived on scene about this time and several youths ran from the playground. The two Officers located a loaded 22 caliber pistol in the basement of the suspect's house (3800 Block of Barnard Avenue). The 15-year-old is an admitted member of the C-14s street gang. While he was in custody, he boasted that he would shoot any member of the Mexican Posse street gang on sight. He was sent to the Children's Detention Center on charges of Possession of a Dangerous Weapon by a Person under 18 and Possession of a Firearm in a School Zone. (I06-0675)

On May 3rd at 5:30 p.m., the Communications Center received numerous 9-1-1 calls reporting a disturbance in the 3700 Block of Somers Avenue where one participant displayed a handgun. The investigation showed that during a gang related confrontation (Spanish Gangster Disciples vs. C-14s), a 20-year-old youth tried to kill a 15-year-old rival. His gun either malfunctioned or the hammer fell on empty chambers. The 20-year-old was walking with a 16-year-old associate, both claiming to be Spanish Gangster Disciples. The 16-year-old was carrying a .44 Caliber revolver for the older youth. They encountered the 15-year-old C-14 and an associate and the four exchanged threats. The 20-year-old took the gun and chased the C-14 gang member. The 15-year-old C-14 fell as he climbed a fence. The SGD pointed the gun at him and said "die now" and pulled the trigger four times. The gun did not fire. Another person told Officer Hauski that he believed the gun had just two bullets in it. Officer Hauski sought a felony Recklessly Endangering Safety complaint on the 20-year-old. The 16-year-old associate was taken to the Detention Center and two other people were charged with concealing the firearm, which was not recovered. (I06-0816)

The Officers and Dispatchers of the Early Shift handled the challenges presented to them in 2006. I am confident that they will continue to provide the high level of police service the citizens of Cudahy deserve.

LATE SHIFT

The Cudahy Police Department Late Shift personnel are comprised of two Dispatchers, two Supervisors, five Patrol Officers and one Power Shift Officer. This unit works from Midnight to 8:00 a.m. with the Power Shift Officer working half the shift (12:00 a.m. to 4 a.m.).

The Emergency Services Dispatchers (ESDs) are Carol Nichols and Mark Sumner. They provide constant and invaluable assistance to Supervisors and Patrol alike. The shift would literally not work without them. Their duties include (but are not limited to) assisting citizens on the phone, dispatching all calls for service, transcribing dictated reports, expediting all shift paper work and acquiring integral information for officers to assist them in performing their duties efficiently and effectively.

Lt. Chris Kraker and Sgt. Geoff Hintz are the Late Shift Supervisors. Together they possess nearly 50 years of police experience. Patrol Officers Joe Paczocha, Brian Scott, Brian Olson, Dan O'Hearn, Tony Andrews, Sean Harrington and Horace Craft are assigned to the Late Shift. Officer Andrews spent half of 2006 on Late Shift prior to accepting assignment to the Early Shift, while Sean Harrington was newly hired to the Department in 2006 and landed on the Late Shift after completing the Field Training Program. Officer Craft is the lone Late Power Shift Officer who works 8:00 p.m. to 4 a.m.

A new and innovative program utilizing paid civilian personnel to assist in certain Department objectives was initiated in 2005 and continues to be quite successful in 2006. These Community Service Officers (CSOs) are responsible for overnight parking enforcement duties on the Late Shift. This service allows Patrol Officers to concentrate solely on law enforcement objectives and has increased the Department's ability to effectively enforce overnight parking regulations.

In 2006, the Late Shift personnel actively enforced traffic and State laws as well as City Ordinances. Over 5,300 calls for service were taken by Officers as they enforced laws and assisted the community in a variety of tasks.

In closing, it is always our pledge on the Late Shift to continue to provide the highest level of professional service to the citizens of Cudahy. While the City sleeps, the personnel of the Late Shift are dedicated to providing a safe environment to work and live within.

TACTICAL UNIT

The Cudahy Police Department Tactical Unit was formally established in 1999 as a 10 man unit, whose primary task was the execution of search warrants. As of 2006, the Tactical Unit has evolved into a team with many more capabilities including, but not limited to crowd control, high risk calls, barricaded suicidal/homicidal subjects and active shooters.

2006 was an active year for the Tactical Unit. The team was led by Lt. Chris Kraker and Police Officer Steven Kaminski. Sergeant Chris Blunt, Detective Glen Haase, Detective Dala Milosavljevic, Police Officer Michael Strzok, Police Officer Francis Stahl, Police Officer Craig Hauski, Police Officer Shawn Grimm, Police Officer Joseph Zblewski, and Police Officer Anthony Andrews. Police Officer Gary Kuchenreuther retired from the team in 2006 after 7 years of dedicated service to the unit.

The Tactical Unit was able to train for 40 hours in 2006. These training sessions included firearms training, static/dynamic room clearing drills, simulated search warrant entries, officer rescue scenarios, rapid deployment training – active school shooter, flash bang training and debriefing of all search warrants and serious tactical incidents.

The standard equipment for a Cudahy Police Department tactical officer differs from a patrol officer. Each tactical team member is issued a Kevlar helmet, special body armor, tactical holster, .40 caliber semi-automatic handgun with attached light, gas mask, communication ear piece as well as a black “SWAT” type uniform. Tactical members also received pagers in 2006 and are “on-call” in the event a serious incident would occur.

In a typical year, the Tactical Unit executes 5 to 10 search warrants and responds to 3 to 5 high risk calls (i.e. barricaded armed subjects, suicidal subjects, etc.). The overwhelming majority of these incidents have ended with no injury to police officers or citizens, which is a credit to the unit and its members, considering the volatility and potential danger of these incidents.

Regrettably, the City of Cudahy has a fair share of illegal drug activity, which necessitates a strong and measured plan of attack by the Police Department. An integral part of any plan to combat illegal drugs is a dedicated tactical unit to execute search warrants and to convey to offenders that illegal activity of any kind will not be tolerated in Cudahy. I can say, without question, the members of the Cudahy Police Department Tactical Unit are a highly competent and dedicated group of officers, who stand ready to meet this challenge.

CLERICAL DIVISION

The Clerical Division is comprised of Police Clerks Barb Swenson, Janet Morris and Margaret Malinowski and Administrative Assistant Jaci Duvall, who are responsible for keeping the Police Department's records and reports moving as demonstrated below.

The preparation of court dockets, pre-trials, warrants, commitments, monthly reports to the State Treasurer, forwarding of dispositions to the Wisconsin State Motor Vehicle Department, and also to the Crime Information Bureau are completed by this Division. In 2006, there were 4,477 cases processed through the Municipal Court including 2,477 pre-trials. 805 commitments and warrants were issued in 2006.

Some of the other areas of responsibility include processing fingerprints and performing background checks for license applicants, invoicing false alarms, and processing motor vehicle accident reports for the State. Each year, more than 1,300 requests by citizens, insurance companies and other government agencies were filled for documents under the Open Record Law.

Gathering statistics for the Federal Bureau of Investigations and Crime Information Bureau from over 2,500 incident reports a year is a tedious task, which requires continued education to ensure we are scoring unusual incidents correctly. These statistics are used for determining the areas of high crime throughout the United States. Each incident report generated by a police officer is broken down into many different categories so that statistics for age, race, gender, violation type, arrest disposition, property type, victim status, etc. can be tabulated.

Although we have a vendor who processes the parking citations on our behalf, numerous tasks must be performed on a daily basis including filing the paid parking citations, checking to ensure that an escalating fee was not added when a payment was made, scheduling pre-trials with the City Attorney and answering numerous parking related phone calls.

Our Police Clerks do so much more than deal with the never ending amount of paper work that comes across their desks. They respond to the needs of angry customers while maintaining their composure; they use their mechanical abilities to repair equipment before a service call is placed; they use each other as a sounding board to solve complex issues. I applaud and appreciate their efforts to continually strive for excellence in the performance of their duties and serving both our internal and external customers.

2006 TRAINING SUMMARY

The Cudahy Police Department has continued to maintain a high level of professionalism by sending its personnel to training sessions throughout the State of Wisconsin. Training for the Department is divided into four categories: Specialized Training, Re-certification Training, In-Service Training and Roll Call Training.

SPECIALIZED TRAINING

Involves advance instruction in both Administration and Operational methods / techniques. Examples of such training include the School of Police Staff and Command at Northwestern University, the FBI National Academy, the Southern Police Institute and various other instruction at local colleges and universities.

RE-CERTIFICATION TRAINING

This training is mandated by the Wisconsin Department of Justice Training and Standards Bureau designed to update and maintain certification for all police personnel within the Cudahy Police Department. Training is offered to all levels of the organization – patrol, detectives, supervisors and management personnel. Many of the technical colleges in the state provide this type of training.

IN-SERVICE TRAINING

Consists of training conducted at the Cudahy Police Department on a variety of topics relevant to the needs of the Department.

ROLL CALL TRAINING

Training sessions conducted during Roll Call to inform police personnel of recent changes and updates of State Laws, Supreme Court Decisions, as well as, other relevant procedures and techniques related to the police profession.


